Shelley Stallard opened the meeting with the evening's program, which was the recognition of charitable recipients. **Pat Nolan** introduced Lisa Holt, who is in charge of the Meals on Wheels program. The program has 60 or more participants, providing 175 hot meals per day and 1,200 per week. For the year 2015/2016, the program provided 50,000 meals, for either temporary or permanent recipients. Pat presented Lisa with the 176 placemats the Guild made over the past year. **Judy Goldsmith** read a touching letter from the mother of a boy who frequently had been hospitalized and had received several quilts. She then introduced Anne Heier, Child Life Specialist at McLaren Northern Michigan Hospital, who talked about the donations of quilts to the Pediatric Unit over the past 18+ years. She related several stories about recipients and their appreciation of the quilt donation.

Shelley presented flowers and a monetary gift to Jan Gray in appreciation of her hard work organizing the Thumb area bus trip.

Tresa Keys officially opened the Guild meeting at 6:17 p.m. with a reading of "Barns and Birthdays." She also welcomed guests and recognized the October and November birthday celebrants. There was no Secretary's Report. The Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented in the newsletter.

Kay Geuder introduced several new members: Judy Lightfoot, Janice Cook, Claudia Libby, Margaret Syverson and guests Evelyn Howell and Jean Sargent, bringing total membership to 124.

Tresa introduced an additional charity, Hospice of Little Traverse Bay. Barb Gutuskey, spokesperson for the Hospice quilters, stated that 56 quilts were donated to Hospice from May to November 2016. The group needs another long arm quilter, as well as more fabric. The group meets on Wednesdays, 9-12:00, at the Hilland House.

Quilts of Valor: Tresa informed the Guild that QOA cannot take any more names until January 2017. They currently have a backlog of 40 quilts. 103 quilts have been completed, but some need binding.

Johanna Kutcher discussed a group called "Servant Hearts", members of which make scrap quilts, hats, scarves and mittens to donate to Manna for distribution. They meet every 4th Thursday at Johanna's home. Members were reminded to call Sue Thompson, Corresponding Secretary, for illnesses and deaths.

Lynn Parrish, the Nomination Co-chair, began the process of voting for officers for the 2017 Board. Ballots were included in the October newsletter. There were no nominations from the floor and nominations were then closed. Ballots were collected from the members. As a piece of trivia for the 30s, Tresa explained the meanings of a "pullet" poll and a "straw" poll.

Sandy Rogers volunteered to assist and be the backup person for Program Chair Diane Simancek. Still needed are chairs for the July picnic, Christmas party and the September Tea for 2017. Also, volunteers are needed for clean-up crews and refreshments. Signup sheets were distributed.

Shelley reminded members that the Christmas party will be held on December 8th at Stafford's Bay View Inn. Attendees need to bring a \$10 gift for exchange.

Members also were reminded that only quilt guild members, who have joined and paid by January 1st, may submit a quilt to the June Quilt Show. Raffle fabric (dots in white and black) is still available. A new category has been added: Multi-generational Quilts. Also, Shelley explained the difference between a miniature quilt and just a "small" quilt. Judith urged members to sell items at the Quilt Show Boutique, which garnered \$3,700 in sales in 2015. Photos of show quilts need to be submitted by January to be considered for the postcard advertising the 2017 Quilt Show.

Tresa asked members to consider volunteering for an intergenerational program called the Learning Studio through the Crooked Tree Arts Council, in which 4th grade enrichment students would work with Guild volunteers to make a quilt block related to the Underground Railroad. Their reference will be the book "Fabric and Fabrications of the Underground Railroad." They will meet this winter on three dates to be determined. Guild members agreed to the change to a 5:30 meet-and-greet time with a 6:00 meeting start.

Diane Simancek presented suggestions for the 2018 programs which include quilt challenges. She suggested either "New Quilts from Old Favorites" or "Oxymorons." Suggestions for teachers and classes are Sue Cortes (Bullseye Quilts and New York Beauty) and the Great Lakes Quilt Project. Also, she would like websites for possible teachers. The business meeting was adjourned at 7:10 p.m.

Renee Prevo won the evening's drawing. Tresa Keys won the batik quilt challenge. Unfortunately, only 2 individuals participated in the Sunbonnet Sue exchange.

Show and Tell followed the meeting.

Tips for Finishing your Quilt on a Longarm

Your longarm machine quilter **wants** to do a good job for you. It is normal for the quilter to have some requirements for the quilts coming in to be quilted. It is possible that the long armer will do some of the tasks listed below, but you should expect to pay for them. If the quilter performs these tasks, she/he is taking time away from what she does best...the machine quilting.

Quilt Backing 1. The quilt back will need to be larger than the quilt top, usually by 4-6 inches on each side. (i.e. a 60" x 80" quilt top needs a backing 68-72" x 88-92") This is so the quilter can load your quilt onto their long arm quilting machine. Though this sounds like a lot, remember that you will cut off the excess before you bind the quilt. This excess can go straight back into your stash. 2. The backing should be square and neat so that it will roll properly onto the roller bars. 3. Remove the selvages. Do not include them within the seam allowances as they will pucker the seam allowance as they are pressed. 4. Do not use sheets. Many quilters will not guarantee their results if you've sent a sheet for the backing fabric. 5. Quilt backing should be pressed. Many will want any seams pressed open to reduce bulk. Check with the quilter you choose to be sure. The quilter is using her limited time to press, not to quilt, which is the real skill that you are paying for.

Important information for ALL members! **We need your participation!**

As part of our quilt show advertising, we develop a postcard with a full color photo of a member's quilt that will be in the show. This has been a very successful campaign as well as an honor for a guild member to have their quilt showcased.

With that in mind, it's time to start preparing for this year's postcard. Any current member, with paid 2017 membership can submit a quilt for consideration for our postcard. In order to have photos taken and for printing lead time, we will need to have the quilt photos submitted to the quilt show chairperson (Shelley Stallard) by the January meeting. Then the quilt show committee will vote on the winner. All submissions will be kept confidential and Shelley will not vote.

In order for your quilt to be considered for the postcard, your quilt must be finished, quilted and bound by the February guild meeting. The quilt will be turned over to Jan Gray at that meeting so photographs can be taken.

Rules:

1. Must be a paid member for the current Sept 2016- Sept 2017 guild year.
2. The chosen quilt must be finished by the February guild meeting for photography.
3. Member must mail (do not email) a color photo to Shelley by the January guild meeting.
4. Do not write on the photo in any way.
5. Shelley Stallard, P.O. Box 463, East Jordan, MI, 49727
6. This will be how the committee members vote, so make it a good photo.
7. One photo per quilt.
8. Members can enter multiple quilts for the postcard.
9. The quilt must be shown in our 2017 show and cannot have been in a previous LTBQG show.
10. The chosen quilt will be turned over to Jan Gray at the February guild meeting.
